Third: Course Description

Never in the history of literature has there been comparable surge of interest in literary criticism, both theoretical and practical. But the variable deluge of critical of writing has become so vast, and sometimes so abstruse, that an attempt at disentangling the truly seminal ideas is absolutely necessary. This course, therefore, is intended to deal with the most basic concepts and the main theoretical trends in recent literary criticism in order to provide M.A. students with broad guidelines for further exploration of a field that is becoming increasingly demanding and highly specialized. Areas to be covered include: New Criticism, Myth Criticism, Structuralism, Feminism, Deconstruction and Psychoanalysis. Whenever possible, theory should be tested by Application to actual literary texts.

Fourth: Course Objectives

- 1. To acquaint students with the main critical theories.
- 2. Develop a coherent context of the critical perspectives' speculations on the definition of literature, literary production and the purpose of literary writing.
- 3. Develop critical skills in close reading and analysis of texts.
