Third: Course Description

This course offers a critical exploration of feminist theory as applied to English literature. Students will examine key feminist thinkers and movements, tracing the evolution of feminist literary criticism from the late 19th century to the present. The course addresses foundational concepts such as gender, patriarchy, intersectionality, and representation, while analyzing how literature has both reflected and resisted dominant ideologies.

Readings will include a diverse range of theoretical texts alongside literary works by women and feminist writers. Students will engage with first-, second-, and third-wave feminism, postcolonial and Black feminist theory, and ecofeminist perspectives, and contemporary transnational feminist approaches. Through close reading, theoretical analysis, and critical discussion, students will develop tools to interpret literary texts through a feminist lens and to articulate informed, scholarly arguments in both written and oral form.

Fourth: Course objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. **Trace the historical development** of feminist theory and its impact on literary studies.
- 2. **Identify and explain key feminist concepts** such as gender, patriarchy, intersectionality, and embodiment.
- 3. **Analyze literary texts** through a variety of feminist theoretical frameworks, including liberal, radical, Marxist, postcolonial, Black, and queer feminism.

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- 4. **Critically assess the representation of women** and gender dynamics in selected English literary texts.
- 5. **Develop original scholarly arguments** about literature and feminism through academic research, writing, and oral presentation.




