Emphasis will be placed on the sources of language history, phonetic and phonological change, morphological, syntactic, lexical and semantic development, foreign influences, language contact, internal and comparative reconstruction, general principles, and comparison with other languages, particularly Arabic.

3. To study the origin and growth of English.
4. To be acquainted with the main language families
5. To be familiarized with the development of pronunciation , syntax, vocabulary and writing system of Old English

7. To be familiarized with the development of pronunciation , syntax, vocabulary and writing system of Modern English
8. To analyse English in the scientific age and as a world language.
